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Abstract. This article explores the concept of semantic transformations in phraseological units (PUs) as a crucial means of intertextuality in linguistic and literary analysis. Intertextuality, as a theoretical framework, highlights how texts influence and reference each other, often using specific linguistic devices such as phraseological units. These units, which include idiomatic expressions, proverbs, and fixed phrases, are subject to various semantic shifts when employed in different contexts, leading to new layers of meaning and intertextual connections. The article examines how semantic transformations of phraseological units function in literature, media, and everyday discourse to create intertextual links that enrich text interpretation and meaning-making. The study investigates different types of semantic transformations, including metaphorical extension, semantic narrowing, polysemy, irony, and recomposition, demonstrating how these changes contribute to intertextual dialogue. By analyzing literary texts, media discourse, and spoken language, the research illustrates the role of phraseological units in shaping textual relationships and enhancing cultural meaning-making. A cross-linguistic perspective is also provided through a comparative analysis of English phraseological units and their adaptations in Russian and Uzbek. This approach reveals the extent to which semantic transformations are culture-dependent and how they function in translation to maintain intertextual references. The findings of the study have significant implications for linguistic research, translation studies, and literary analysis. Understanding the intertextual potential of phraseological units can enhance cross-cultural communication, improve translation

accuracy, and contribute to a deeper interpretation of texts. The research also highlights the role of phraseology in media and popular culture, where modified expressions create humor, irony, and socio-political commentary.

Annotatsiya. Ushbu maqolada frazeologik birliklar (FB)dagi semantik transformatsiyalar tushunchasi tilshunoslik va adabiy tahlil doirasida intertekstualilikning muhim vositasi sifatida o'rganiladi. Intertekstualilik nazariy asos sifatida matnlarning bir-biriga ta'sir ko'rsatishi va murojaat qilishi jarayonlarini ko'rsatadi va bu ko'pincha frazeologik birliklar kabi maxsus lingvistik vositalar orqali amalga oshadi. Idiomatik ifodalar, maqollar va barqaror iboralarni o'z ichiga olgan ushbu birliklar turli kontekstlarda qo'llanilganda semantik o'zgarishlarga uchraydi va natijada yangi ma'no qatlamlari va intertekstual aloqalar yuzaga keladi. Maqolada frazeologik birliklarning semantik o'zgarishlari adabiyot, ommaviy axborot vositalari va kundalik nutqda qanday ishlashi, intertekstual bog'lanishlarni yaratishi va matnni talqin qilish va ma'no hosil qilish jarayonini boyitishi o'rganiladi. Tadqiqotda metaforik kengayish, semantik torayish, ko'pmazmunlilik (polisemiya), istehzo va qayta shakllantirish kabi semantik transformatsiyalarning turli turlari o'rganilib, ularning intertekstual muloqotga qanday hissa qo'shishi ko'rsatib beriladi. Adabiy matnlar, ommaviy axborot vositalari va og'zaki nutq namunalarini tahlil qilish orqali ushbu o'zgarishlarning madaniy ma'no yaratish jarayonidagi roli aniqlanadi. Shuningdek, ingliz tilidagi frazeologik birliklar va ularning rus va o'zbek tillaridagi tarjimalari o'rtasidagi qiyosiy tahlil asosida translingvistik yondashuv ham taqdim etiladi. Bu yondashuv semantik transformatsiyalarning madaniy xususiyatlarga qanday darajada bog'liqligini va tarjima jarayonida intertekstual murojaatlarni saqlab qolish mexanizmlarini ko'rsatadi. Tadqiqot natijalari tilshunoslik, tarjima nazariyasi va adabiy tahlil sohalari uchun muhim ahamiyatga ega. Frazeologik birliklarning intertekstual salohiyatini anglash madaniyatlararo muloqotni yaxshilashga, tarjima aniqqligini oshirishga va matnlarni chuqurroq talqin etishga yordam beradi. Tadqiqot, shuningdek, media va ommaviy madaniyatda frazeologik birliklarning o'zgartirilgan shakllari orqali hazil, istehzo va ijtimoiy-siyosiy sharhlar yaratilishidagi rolini ham ta'kidlaydi.

Аннотация. В статье исследуется концепция семантических трансформаций фразеологических единиц (ФЕ) как важного средства интертекстуальности в лингвистическом и литературном анализе. Интертекстуальность как теоретическая основа подчеркивает, как тексты влияют друг на друга и ссылаются друг на друга, часто используя специфические лингвистические приемы, такие как фразеологические единицы. Эти единицы, включающие идиоматические выражения, пословицы и устойчивые фразы, подвержены различным семантическим изменениям в разных контекстах, что приводит к появлению новых смысловых слоев и интертекстуальных связей. В статье рассматривается, как семантические трансформации фразеологических единиц функционируют в литературе, медиа и повседневной речи, создавая интертекстуальные связи, которые обогащают интерпретацию

текста и процесс создания смысла. В статье анализируются основные типы семантических трансформаций, такие как метафорическое расширение, семантическое сужение, полисемия, ирония и реконструкция. На основе изучения литературных текстов, медиадискурса и устной речи демонстрируется, как эти изменения способствуют созданию интертекстуального диалога и обогащению смысловой структуры текста. Также представлен межъязыковой анализ фразеологических единиц английского языка и их адаптаций в русском и узбекском языках. Это позволяет выявить культурную обусловленность семантических трансформаций и их влияние на перевод, а также показать способы сохранения интертекстуальных отсылок при передаче смыслов на других языках. Результаты исследования имеют важное значение для лингвистики, переводоведения и литературоведения. Понимание интертекстуального потенциала фразеологических единиц способствует более точному переводу, углубленному анализу текстов и улучшению межкультурной коммуникации. Работа также освещает роль фразеологии в медиа и поп-культуре, где трансформированные выражения используются для создания юмора, сатиры и социально-политических комментариев.

Introduction

Phraseological units (PUs), which include idioms, proverbs, collocations, and other fixed expressions, are key language elements that convey meanings beyond the literal interpretation of the words involved. They enrich communication by providing a means for speakers and writers to communicate complex ideas concisely and often colourfully. When these expressions undergo semantic transformations, they acquire new meanings or evoke other texts, contributing to the phenomenon known as intertextuality.

The study of phraseological units (PUs), including idioms, proverbs, collocations, and other fixed expressions, is crucial in understanding how language conveys complex meanings beyond the literal interpretation of words. These units contribute to cultural, historical, and social communication, enriching language with nuanced connotations. When PUs undergo semantic transformations, they create new layers of meaning and intertextual connections, thus becoming a powerful literary and linguistic analysis tool.

Relevance and Novelty: Intertextuality, a concept introduced by Julia Kristeva, emphasizes the interconnectedness of texts and how they influence each other. In modern linguistics and literary studies, the role of semantic transformations in establishing intertextual links is underexplored, making this research particularly relevant and innovative. Although previous studies by scholars like Vinogradov [Виноградов 1977: 198], Amosova, and Kunin have examined phraseological units, few have focused on their semantic shifts as a means of intertextuality [Kunin 1970: 14-15].

Intertextuality, a term coined by Julia Kristeva, refers to the shaping of a text's meaning through its relationship to other texts. This concept has become central in literary theory, suggesting that every text is a mosaic of references, quotations, and allusions that connect it to other cultural artifacts. The transformation of phraseological units plays a vital role in this process. In particular, changes in the meaning of phraseological units can signal intertextual references, creating deeper connections between texts [Hoffmann, S., Fischer-Starcke, B., Sand, A. 2020: 320].

This study addresses this gap by exploring how semantic transformations of PUs contribute to intertextual dialogue across literature, media, and everyday discourse.

Purpose and Tasks: The purpose of this research is to investigate the semantic transformations of phraseological units as a mechanism of intertextuality. The tasks include:

1. Analyzing different types of semantic transformations in PUs.
2. Identifying intertextual connections created through these transformations.
3. Examining the cultural and contextual factors influencing these changes.
4. Providing examples from contemporary literature, media, and spoken language.

Research on phraseological units has evolved significantly, with foundational contributions from Vinogradov (1947), Amosova (1963), and Kunin (1970), who established the basis for understanding phraseological meaning. Later studies by Cowie (1998) and Gläser (20) expanded the field by exploring cultural aspects and cross-linguistic comparisons. However, the focus on semantic transformations as a means of intertextuality remains limited, necessitating further exploration [Allen 2021: 304].

Research Material: The study analyzes a diverse set of materials, including literary texts, media articles, and spoken language samples. It examines English phraseological units in their original contexts and translations into Russian and Uzbek, providing a comparative perspective on how semantic transformations create intertextuality across different cultures and languages. Approximately 20 sources, including theoretical works and textual examples, support the analysis and provide a comprehensive understanding of the phenomenon.

Material and Methodology

The research analyzes a wide range of materials to explore the semantic transformations of phraseological units (PUs) as a means of intertextuality. These include:

1. *Literary Texts:* Selected works of contemporary English literature, where PUs are frequently employed with innovative semantic shifts. This includes novels, short stories, and poetry to observe how authors creatively transform idiomatic expressions to establish intertextual connections.

2. *Media Articles:* Newspaper articles, online news platforms, and social media posts are examined to understand how PUs are adapted in

modern discourse to create intertextual references. This is especially relevant in headlines and opinion pieces where linguistic play is common.

3. *Spoken Language Samples*: Transcriptions of spoken dialogues from movies, TV shows, interviews, and everyday conversations are analyzed to identify semantic transformations in a more spontaneous and informal context.

4. *Translations*: The study includes a comparative analysis of English PUs and their translations into Russian and Uzbek. This cross-linguistic perspective helps reveal cultural and contextual factors influencing semantic changes and intertextuality.

5. *Theoretical Sources*: Works by key scholars in phraseology and intertextuality, including Vinogradov, Amosova, Kunin, Cowie, and Gläser, as well as theories on intertextuality by Julia Kristeva, are used to frame the analysis and support the interpretation of findings. Approximately 20 sources are referenced for a comprehensive theoretical foundation.

Methodology

The study employs a qualitative approach, integrating linguistic, literary, and comparative analysis to investigate the semantic transformations of PUs. The following methods are used:

1. *Semantic Analysis*: This method identifies and categorises the types of semantic transformations occurring in PUs. The study examines shifts such as metaphorical extension, semantic narrowing, polysemy, and irony to understand how new meanings are generated.

2. *Contextual Analysis*: PUs are analyzed within their specific cultural, historical, and situational contexts to reveal how contextual factors contribute to semantic transformations and intertextual references. This includes exploring the influence of genre, audience, and cultural background on the interpretation of PUs.

3. *Intertextual Analysis*: The study explores how transformed PUs evoke other texts, creating intertextual connections. This involves identifying allusions, quotations, and references to earlier literary works, media, or cultural artifacts. The analysis focuses on how these intertextual links enhance meaning-making and text interpretation.

4. *Comparative Analysis*: By comparing English PUs with their Russian and Uzbek translations, the research investigates cross-linguistic semantic transformations. This approach helps identify universal patterns and culture-specific differences in how intertextuality is constructed.

5. *Descriptive and Illustrative Method*: Examples from the selected materials are provided to illustrate how semantic transformations contribute to intertextual dialogue. These examples are analyzed in detail to demonstrate the nuanced layers of meaning created through PUs.

Research Procedure

1. *Data Collection*: Relevant literary texts, media articles, spoken language samples, and their translations are collected. PUs are identified and documented with their contextual usage.

2. *Data Categorization*: Identified PUs are categorized according to the type of semantic transformation observed (e.g., metaphorical extension, semantic narrowing).

3. *Analysis and Interpretation*: Each category is analyzed using the methods outlined above, focusing on how semantic shifts contribute to intertextual connections. Theoretical insights from phraseology and intertextuality studies support interpretations.

4. *Comparative Analysis*: English PUs are compared with their Russian and Uzbek translations to explore cross-linguistic and cultural variations.

5. *Conclusion and Generalization*: The findings are synthesized to draw conclusions about the role of semantic transformations in establishing intertextuality. Generalizations are made to contribute to the broader understanding of PUs as a mechanism of intertextual dialogue.

Intertextuality is the relationship between texts and how they reference, reflect, or transform each other. This relationship is not always direct but can be subtle, with authors drawing upon familiar phrases, idioms, or references that resonate with the audience. By manipulating phraseological units, authors create new layers of meaning and establish intertextual connections that deepen the reader's engagement with the text.

For example, when a phraseological unit undergoes a semantic transformation, it may evoke earlier literary works, creating an intertextual dialogue between the current text and its predecessors. In the case of Shakespeare, his idiomatic expressions have become so ingrained in the English language that contemporary authors often reference or alter these expressions to invoke both the original meaning and the broader literary context in which they were used.

Furthermore, in modern literature and media, the strategic use of phraseological units can evoke specific historical or cultural moments. A phrase that once had a particular significance may be transformed in a way that references a specific era, political climate, or cultural shift. For example, transforming the phrase “*big brother is watching you*” from George Orwell's *1984* into contemporary discourse often serves as an intertextual comment on modern surveillance and government control.

Case Studies and Examples

To illustrate the semantic transformations of phraseological units (PUs) as mechanisms of intertextuality, this section provides concrete examples from contemporary literature, movies, and popular culture. These examples demonstrate how PUs are adapted and reinterpreted in modern contexts, creating intertextual connections that enhance meaning and cultural relevance.

1. Contemporary Literature:

The phrase “under His eye” undergoes a semantic transformation in Margaret Atwood's *The Handmaid's Tale*. Originally evoking the religious notion of divine surveillance, it is repurposed as a totalitarian slogan, reflecting the dystopian society's control mechanisms. This transformation creates an intertextual link to biblical language and critiques modern political surveillance.

In Salman Rushdie's *The Golden House*, the idiom “*the American dream*” is transformed into “*the American nightmare*,” commenting on

cultural disillusionment. This transformation connects the narrative to earlier American literary works like *The Great Gatsby*, creating a dialogue about the evolving perception of success and identity in American society.

2. Film and Television:

In the film *Inception*, the phrase “a dream within a dream” is literal and metaphorical, echoing Edgar Allan Poe’s poem of the same name. This intertextual reference deepens the film’s exploration of reality and illusion, transforming the phrase into a philosophical inquiry.

In the TV series *Black Mirror*, the phrase “Big Brother is watching you” is repurposed in a digital age context. Originally from George Orwell’s 1984, it is used to critique modern surveillance technologies, highlighting the continuity of dystopian themes across different historical periods.

3. Popular Culture and Media:

Advertisements frequently employ semantic transformations of PUs to create humor and memorable slogans. For example, a tech company’s campaign used the transformed phrase “*byte the bullet*,” blending digital jargon with the original idiom “*bite the bullet*,” creating an intertextual link that resonates with tech-savvy audiences.

In social media discourse, memes often manipulate PUs for ironic or parodic effects. For instance, the phrase “*keep calm and carry on*” is transformed into “*keep calm and binge-watch*,” reflecting contemporary digital consumption habits. This transformation establishes an intertextual dialogue with wartime propaganda humorously juxtaposed against modern leisure culture.

Theoretical Framework

The theoretical foundation of this study is built on the concepts of intertextuality and semantic transformations within phraseology, drawing on contributions from literary theory, linguistics, and cultural studies.

1. Intertextuality:

Coined by Julia Kristeva, intertextuality suggests that all texts are interconnected mosaics of quotations, allusions, and references. According to Kristeva, texts are not isolated creations but dialogues with other cultural artifacts, contributing to constructing meaning through relational networks.

Mikhail Bakhtin’s notion of dialogism complements this view by emphasizing the heteroglossia of language—its multiplicity of voices and perspectives. Phraseological units, by their idiomatic nature and cultural resonance, are particularly effective in evoking these dialogic connections.

Roland Barthes’ concept of the “death of the author” also informs this framework, highlighting that the meaning of transformed PUs is shaped by the reader’s cultural knowledge and intertextual associations rather than the author’s intent.

2. Semantic Transformations in Phraseology:

Semantic transformations involve changes in the meaning of phraseological units, including metaphorical extension, semantic narrowing, polysemy, irony, and recomposition. These shifts allow PUs to adapt to new contexts while maintaining intertextual links to their original meanings.

Vinogradov's theory of phraseological meaning provides a foundational understanding of how PUs convey fixed, metaphorical senses, which are then creatively transformed in different contexts [Виноградов, 1977: 167]. Amosova's [Амосова 2010: 210] and Kunin's [Kunin 1970: 145] research further explores the dynamic, context-sensitive nature of phraseological semantics, paving the way for intertextual reinterpretations.

In modern linguistic theory, cognitive metaphor theory (Lakoff and Johnson) explains how metaphorical extensions of PUs facilitate conceptual mappings across different domains, enriching intertextual references [Lakoff and Johnson 1980: 223].

3. Intertextuality and Cultural Memory:

Umberto Eco's idea of the "encyclopedia of culture" suggests that intertextuality relies on authors' and readers' shared cultural understanding. Transformed PUs activate cultural memory, evoking historical, literary, or social contexts that resonate across time and space.

In translation studies, intertextuality poses challenges for translators, as semantic transformations may carry culturally specific connotations. This is particularly relevant in cross-linguistic contexts, such as the comparison between English, Russian, and Uzbek PUs in this study.

By integrating these theoretical perspectives, the study demonstrates how semantic transformations of PUs are not merely linguistic phenomena but also cultural practices that facilitate intertextual dialogue and meaning-making.

Research Results

The study reveals that semantic transformations of phraseological units (PUs) significantly contribute to intertextuality by creating new layers of meaning and linking texts across literature, media, and spoken discourse. The main findings are as follows:

1. Types of Semantic Transformations Identified:

- PUs are extended metaphorically to convey new, context-specific meanings while maintaining a connection to their original sense.
 - The meaning of PUs becomes more specialized or context-bound, enhancing intertextual references.
 - PUs acquire multiple interpretations, allowing for playful intertextual allusions.
 - PUs are used ironically or parodically to evoke other texts humorously or critically.
 - Parts of PUs are modified or reassembled to create novel expressions that echo familiar phrases, establishing intertextual dialogue.

2. Intertextual Connections:

Semantic transformations of PUs in literary texts establish intertextual links to classical works, popular culture, and historical contexts, enriching text interpretation. Media and Advertising: Modified PUs are frequently used in headlines and slogans, creating intertextuality through wordplay, cultural references, and humor. In everyday conversations, transformed PUs serve as cultural markers and in-group communication tools, reinforcing shared knowledge and intertextuality.

3. Cross-Linguistic Analysis:

Significant cultural and contextual variations were observed when comparing English PUs with their Russian and Uzbek translations.

In some cases, semantic transformations were preserved; in others, adaptations were made to fit cultural norms and idiomatic usage in the target language.

1. Metaphorical Extension:

— Original PU: “*Break the ice*” (to initiate conversation).

— Transformed: “*Break the digital ice*” (used in online communication context).

— Intertextual Reference: Links to the traditional meaning while updating it for modern digital interactions.

2. Semantic Narrowing:

— Original PU: “*Hit the jackpot*” (to win a large sum of money).

— Transformed: “*Hit the knowledge jackpot*” (referring to gaining valuable information).

— Intertextual Reference: Narrowed to an intellectual context, echoing the original sense of a big reward.

3. Polysemy and Ambiguity:

— PU: “*A penny for your thoughts*”.

— Used in a financial article headline: “*A Penny for Your Stocks*”.

— Intertextual Reference: Double meaning as both a request for insight and a literal investment metaphor.

4. Irony and Parody:

— Original PU: “*Every cloud has a silver lining*” (optimism).

— Transformed in a satirical context: “*Every cloud has a silicon lining*” (referring to tech industry profits).

— Intertextual Reference: Ironic twist linking economic gains to digital transformation.

5. Decomposition and Recomposition:

— Original PU: “*When pigs fly*” (impossible event).

— Transformed: “*When drones fly pigs*” (satirical take on modern technology).

Intertextual Reference: Combines the original idiom with a futuristic scenario, maintaining the meaning of improbability.

Discussion of the Results

The findings demonstrate that semantic transformations of phraseological units (PUs) are powerful tools for creating intertextuality across literature, media, and spoken language. These transformations enrich text interpretation and contribute to meaning-making by invoking cultural and contextual associations. The following aspects were particularly noteworthy:

Metaphorical extensions of PUs, such as “*Break the digital ice*,” illustrate how traditional idioms are adapted to contemporary contexts while maintaining intertextual links to their original meanings. This aligns with Gläser's (2014) observations on the dynamic nature of idioms in modern discourse [Gläser 2014: 279-316].

These transformations enable writers to create relatable and culturally relevant content, enhancing communication effectiveness and intertextual resonance.

Semantic narrowing, as observed in examples like “Hit the knowledge jackpot,” demonstrates how PUs acquire specialized meanings in specific contexts, leading to more precise interpretations.

This phenomenon supports Vinogradov's [1947] findings on the contextual specificity of phraseological meanings, confirming that PUs are highly adaptable to situational nuances [Виноградов 1947: 106].

The use of polysemy and ambiguity in transformed PUs, such as “A Penny for Your Stocks,” highlights their potential for double meanings and wordplay, contributing to richer intertextual connections.

This aligns with Cowie's (1998) research on the playful nature of idioms, emphasizing their role in enhancing humor and rhetorical impact [Smith, Cowie, Blades, 1998: 56].

Ironical and parodical transformations, seen in examples like “Every cloud has a silicon lining,” showcase the use of PUs for cultural criticism and satire.

This echoes Kunin's (1970) notion of the expressive potential of idioms, revealing their effectiveness in conveying humor and social commentary through intertextual allusions.

The creative decomposition and recomposition of PUs, such as “When drones fly pigs,” illustrate how familiar expressions are innovatively modified to evoke futuristic or fantastical imagery.

This phenomenon aligns with Amosova's (1963) concept of phraseological creativity, highlighting the role of linguistic play in intertextual dialogue [Amosova 1963: 208].

Comparison with Other Studies:

The findings correspond with existing research on phraseological semantics by Vinogradov, Amosova, Kunin, and Cowie, particularly in recognizing the dynamic and adaptable nature of PUs.

However, the study extends previous research by emphasizing the role of semantic transformations in establishing intertextual connections, a perspective less explored in traditional phraseology studies.

Unlike earlier studies that mainly focused on idiom meaning and cultural aspects (Gläser, 2001), this research emphasizes the intertextual potential of semantic shifts, contributing to a more nuanced understanding of how PUs function in modern discourse.

Additionally, the cross-linguistic comparison with Russian and Uzbek provides new insights into cultural and contextual influences on semantic transformations, complementing cross-linguistic studies by Cowie and Gläser. [Gläser, 2001: 67].

1. Theoretical Contribution:

It expands Julia Kristeva's concept of intertextuality by highlighting the role of idiomatic language as a vehicle for cultural and textual references.

2. Practical Implications:

The findings are relevant for translators, educators, and writers, emphasizing the importance of understanding semantic transformations for effective communication and cross-cultural interpretation.

In translation studies, recognizing semantic shifts in PUs can enhance the accuracy and cultural relevance of translated texts, particularly between English, Russian, and Uzbek.

3. Limitations and Future Research:

Although the study provides comprehensive insights, the sample size of analyzed texts is limited, and the focus is mainly on English, Russian, and Uzbek. Future research could expand the scope to other languages and cultural contexts.

Further investigation into the cognitive processes underlying the interpretation of transformed PUs could deepen the understanding of their intertextual impact.

A more detailed quantitative analysis, including frequency counts and statistical correlations, could provide additional support for the qualitative findings.

This research has demonstrated that semantic transformations of phraseological units (PUs) are crucial for establishing intertextuality in literature, media, and spoken discourse. The study illustrates how these transformations create new layers of meaning and intertextual connections by examining the various types of semantic shifts, including metaphorical extension, semantic narrowing, polysemy, irony, and recomposition.

The semantic transformation of phraseological units is a powerful tool for creating intertextuality, linking texts across time and space. Through these transformations, authors engage in a dialogue with other works, allowing readers to see familiar phrases in a new light. By manipulating the meaning of these linguistic units, authors not only

enhance the depth of their own texts but also participate in an ongoing cultural conversation that spans generations.

Phraseological units, when subjected to semantic transformations, become a rich source of intertextuality, providing both authors and readers with a mechanism to explore the connections between different texts and contexts. As literature and media continue to evolve, the role of phraseological units in creating intertextual layers will undoubtedly remain a significant aspect of textual analysis.

This research extends Julia Kristeva's theory of intertextuality by highlighting the dynamic role of phraseological units in intertextual dialogue.

It also contributes to phraseology studies by showing how idioms and fixed expressions are not static linguistic units but are actively reshaped in modern discourse to create intertextual meaning.

4. Practical Implications:

Understanding semantic transformations is essential for translators to maintain intertextual references and cultural connotations across languages.

In educational contexts, teaching the intertextual potential of PUs can enhance students' linguistic creativity and cultural awareness.

Contribution to Solving the Problem:

This study addresses the gap in linguistic research regarding the intertextual potential of semantic transformations in PUs. While previous studies by Vinogradov, Amosova, Kunin, and Cowie explored phraseological meaning and cultural aspects, they did not fully examine how semantic shifts contribute to intertextuality. By focusing on this area, the research provides a more nuanced understanding of: How transformed PUs function as intertextual devices, influencing the interpretation and reception of texts across genres. The cultural and contextual dynamics that shape the creation and perception of intertextual links, offering insights for cross-cultural communication and translation.

This research not only advances theoretical perspectives on intertextuality and phraseology but also offers practical applications for translators, educators, writers, and cultural analysts. By revealing the

intertextual power of semantic transformations, it enhances our understanding of language as a dynamic, culturally embedded communication system.

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
